Description:

A mounded perennial with trailing tendencies that blooms profusely throughout the season; masses of sunshine yellow cup shaped blooms fade to peach-pink tones; drought tolerant once established; an excellent choice for gardens, containers and borders

Ornamental Features

Ladybird Sunglow Texas Primrose has masses of beautiful lightly-scented yellow cup-shaped flowers at the ends of the stems from early spring to late summer, which are most effective when planted in groupings. Its small narrow leaves remain green in color throughout the year.

Landscape Attributes

Ladybird Sunglow Texas Primrose is an herbaceous evergreen perennial with a mounded form. It brings an extremely fine and delicate texture to the garden composition and should be used to full effect.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. It is a good choice for attracting birds, bees and butterflies to your yard. It has no significant negative characteristics.

Planting & Growing

Ladybird Sunglow Texas Primrose will grow to be about 8 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 20 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 12 inches apart. Its foliage tends to remain low and dense right to the ground. It grows at a fast rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 5 years. As an evegreen perennial, this plant will typically keep its form and foliage year-round.

This plant does best in full sun to partial shade. It prefers dry to average moisture levels with very well-drained soil, and will often die in standing water. It is considered to be drought-tolerant, and thus makes an ideal choice for a low-water garden or xeriscape application. It is not particular as to soil type, but has a definite preference for alkaline soils. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid.
